





BBBS seeks creative ways to match 35 African-American boys from waitlist with African-American male mentors

Racine, WI. – Big Brothers Big Sisters of Racine and Kenosha County is kicking off a recruitment campaign aimed at recruiting African American males to serve as Big Brothers to 35 African-American boys between the ages of 7 and 17 that have been on a waiting list, some for more than 3 years.

"Due to societal norms, these innocent children are harder to place. This initiative is geared toward matching our adorable and deserving Littles with a long-term Bigs," said Sonya Thomas, executive director of Big Brothers Big Sisters of Racine and Kenosha.

Thomas said her team is here to offer nontraditional ways that go beyond the

35 African-American have been on a waitlist for more than 2 years.

Also, fraternities and groups that promote brotherhood, like Alpha Phi Alpha, Kappa Alpha Psi, Omega Psi Phi can serve in a group setting a couple hours each month. All along-the-way, the agency will offer support and services at no cost to Bigs or Littles, she said.

"The need is great. Based on information from our waitlisted applicants, most of the boys live in a single-parent, female led, home. This means they are at risk of growing up without a positive male role model that will stand by them and empower them to reach their full potential."

Big Brothers Big Sisters of American has a long-time program works. They have endured for more than 100 years. Outcomes prove:

- 97% of children are more likely to attend college when they are mentored by a caring male mentor
- 88% of youth are more respectful of their parents and guardians, and
- 97% of youth avoid risky behaviors.

"Our most frequent request for mentors comes from mothers or female guardians. They are desperately seeking an African-American male who will be willing to spend a few hours a month to help their boy navigate the challenges of becoming a black man in today's world," Thomas said.

Recently, Big Brothers Big Sisters of America launched a campaign to reinforce its mission of creating life-long relationships. The message centers around the fact



African-American men are needed to mentor youth.

that potential is innate within every child, and we, as adults, and Bigs are here to defend that potential.

"Can we count on you to inspire potential?" Thomas questioned.

2 Swift Suits

Eric Dogans Sr., born and raised in Racine, has found himself a nice cozy spot in downtown Racine's area of interest. Next to Plush Clothing, 2 Swift Suits, has been open since September 21, 2019. Last November, with the help of the microloan and minority business loan, everything was made possible, and the search for a storefront began. There was the option of moving to Elmwood Plaza onto Washington Ave between Dunkin Donuts and Century 21, this was preferred. The only problem they found was that they would have to come out of pocket for the inside design. Also, Eric had discovered there is more foot traction on Main St. than Washington.

Downtown, WWBIC helped them to find properties. Some California owners bought several properties, and one they owned was the one Eric had his eye on. After speaking with the owners, he convinced them to sell the place to him for a 3-year lease, and a plus was that they would already renovate the inside anyway because no one had owned the property in 5-10 years. In early April, the construction began. Their opening date was June 17, 2019, but with issues, they had to push it back.

WWBIC, an initial funder, pulled funding once they locked the place down. The reason is unknown. Then there were construction issues with the flooring, ceiling, ductwork, etc. His wife was a major help in getting everything done, and he did not fail to mention how grateful he was for her help in doing so. The funny thing is, Eric, thought about starting his own cloth diaper business because there were



no minority-owned ones. In the Intro to Business through WWBIC (16 weeks), Eric had put this idea into play, but his wife reminded him of how passionate he was about suits.

Eric had a business plan, product research, EIN and LLC set up, and name trademarked. He even had the name on his license plates for 8 years now. The more information he had and the level of preparedness put him on another level in the program. Originally Eric went to Parkside then Whitewater for computer science. He got a job at UPS as a part-time driver for 5 years and then full time for 20 years. Once he tore his rotator cuff 2x on the same shoulder, he knew it was time to do something else.



In Eric's store, you will find entry-level suits for \$199, high end for \$399-\$450, and custom suits made to order is \$700 to start. The suits you will find will be by Montee Taylon Holland 3pc, starting at \$399. Montee has had 20 years in the business and has made suits for NBA Players, Steve Harvey, Cedric the Entertainer, and suits for the men on Power. Carrelli Imports Suits in 5 styles and 5 colors will start at \$199. Then there will be Statement suits, \$199-\$399. The sizes of all the shirts range from 15 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 20 and only in button-down fashion, though the French cuffs are available.

The shoes you will find in the store include Carrucci, David Eden, Giorgio Brutini, Stacy Adams, Belvedere. They will have exotic skins like crocs, gator, eel, and even skins

like Ostrich. The shoes will range from \$130 to \$450. He wants his store to have mid to high-end pricing to reflect the product inside.

The store also provides little things such as matching tie and sock sets, even shirt, sock, and tie combos. This differs greatly from most stores. Eric would love to talk to the coaches in the high schools and try to get in more shirt and tie combos for the guys so they can dress a little nicer for their game days and events. Eric has shown me great passion when speaking about the suits he carries, how he got into it, and all that entails in owning, coming up with your own ideas, and being around the product.

Eric would like to provide the city with a different shopping experience and one of a kind pieces. He wants to keep the dollars in Racine instead of having people always travel to Chicago or Milwaukee to find what they are looking for. Quality is always the goal. He says, "\$100 for 4 to 5 pieces is not a deal." He expresses with great knowledge in knowing what material quality is and what may not last as long as something else. People may pay a little more, but the suit will last longer. "Everything in the store will always be something I would wear myself. I am not going to sell something I would not put on." I felt the genuineness in this statement.

Something that he will be looking forward to is accessorizing different pieces with the variety of inventory in-store, talking with people about suits, and hopefully getting an onsite Taylor to work part-time 15 to 20 hours a week. He uses Golden Needle in Racine and Sewing by Susie in Oak Creek. He finds them very trustworthy. I appreciated the selection, the atmosphere, and passion I saw throughout the store with its layout, design, and suits and accessories on display. There is much attention to detail. Gateway celebrates expansion of leading-edge Industry 4.0 center

A national model for advanced manufacturing. A place where programs and artificial intelligence systems meet. A facility where students can gain leading-edge Industry 4.0 skills. A place where today's manufacturers can find workers with the skills to help their businesses grow.

These are but a few of the thoughts offered by government, education and industry leaders about the Gateway Technical College SC Johnson iMET Center at its renovation and expansion ribbon-cutting celebration event Tuesday, Oct. 22.

"This expansion is not only great for the Racine County area, but it is great for Wisconsin's manufacturing industry," said Wisconsin Governor Tony Evers. Many national companies stepped forward to provide resources,

equipment and industry knowledge to help make the center a local, and national, site of Industry 4.0 training.

'Gateway's development represents a shining example of industry, education and legislation coming together to create something that benefits everyone," said Richard Vincent, chief business officer, Foxconn Industrial Internet. "It benefits industry by creating a well-trained, talented workforce in emerging technologies such as advanced manufacturing, data analytics and high-performance computers. It's home to inventive education, giving faculty a place to create and develop new curriculum, and establishes a new paradigm of teaching innovation focused on hands-on experience.

'This is a new epicenter of technological innovation. A new group of professionals will graduate from this institution with the skills to build our future."

The expansion features added labs with cutting-edge training equipment to provide the framework for advanced manufacturing career skills. Some of the high-tech training equipment is portable, allowing college instructors to provide training on-site to area manufacturers and high schools

Gateway Technical College President and CEO Bryan Albrecht said the expansion of the center is like the old adage that it takes a village to raise a child, illustrated by representatives from eight different states at the event.

Real Talk Therapy: Anti-Social Media

Last month I told you to shake it off but pleThe 3 basic tenets of communication are a message, a messenger, and a receiver. Although the way humans communicate has evolved over time the functional premise of communication remains constant. From face-to-face expression, pictures & symbols, letters, telegraph, telephone, email, text messaging, and social media the evolution of communication has significant implications that I would like for you to consider. Although modern forms of communication would seem to make it more convenient for us to express ourselves I would like to challenge that notion.

Social media is also hindering our literacy. Educators are challenged with promoting balanced literacy; the acquisition of language using reading, writing, and



speaking, among a generation of students who've become accustomed to using modern short-cuts to express themselves often before entering school. Unfortunately bad habits are not easily broken. When people use short acronyms like IDK (I

don't know), LOL (laughing out loud), and SMH (shaking my head) generically rather than expressing themselves completely they miss the opportunities for growth that are naturally promoted by reading fluently, writing coherently, and speaking persuasively. As far as I'm concerned social media is rapidly evolving into anti-social media.

As a general rule once society evolves to a more convenient means of doing things, whether it be communication or other, we generally don't go back to doing things the old-fashioned way. Even though the old-fashioned is generally of a higher caliber where quality trumps quantity the reality of the matter is that modern trends continue to evolve. I would like to make a humble suggestion that we take time to purposefully and passionately communicate with those we love, value, esteem, and hold dear to our hearts. Let's make a conscious effort to spend quality time with and express our-



selves clearly and thoughtfully to those who matter to us most. Let's not allow social media to minimize us to anti-social beings.

It doesn't matter what you use for a







Is This a Good Time to Refinance Your Mortgage?

If you have a home mortgage, it likely represents one your largest monthly expenses. With interest rates on the decline, you may be wondering if you could lower your home payments by refinancing the terms of your mortgage. Here are some factors to consider:

In recent months, mortgage rates have moved significantly lower. The interest rate on a 30-year mortgage dropped from 4.94% in November 2018 to 3.49% in early September 2019. That means a \$300,000 mortgage that would have resulted in monthly payments of approximately \$1,599 (principal and interest) at the higher rate, will amount to roughly \$1,345 at the lower rate, or a savings of 16% on the monthly payment.

If current rates are noticeably lower than the rate you pay on your existing mortgage, there may be an opportunity to reduce your monthly payment. If you can obtain a mortgage for an interest rate that is at least 1% below the rate you are paying, it is worth investigating. The case to refinance is more obvious if market rates are 2% or more below the rate on your current mortgage.

It's more than interest rates

Declining rates are the primary impetus to pursue refinancing. When those conditions are in place, it also opens up opportunities to improve your long-term financial position, depending on the terms of your current loan. You may want to consider:

• Refinancing with a shorter-term loan. There can be significant cost savings over the life of your mortgage if you choose a 15-year mortgage instead of the typical 30-year mortgage. Lower rates may make a 15-year



mortgage work for your budget.

• Switching to a fixed-rate mortgage. If you hold an adjust-able-rate mortgage, this may be a great opportunity to lock in a low, long-term mortgage rate with a 15- or 30-year loan.

Assessing the costs of refinancing

There are different factors that might offset the potential benefits of refinancing, depending on your circumstances. For starters, refinancing isn't free. Lenders will assess a cost to the loan equal to approximately 3% to 6% of the principal amount. So, with a \$100,000 loan, costs could add up to \$3,000 to \$6,000. You want to be certain your savings in interest charges will ultimately offset those fees. In some cases, lenders may limit the fees charged, but in doing so, they typically bump up the interest rate.

You'll need to calculate a payback period on refinancing – at what point will your interest savings overcome any costs associated with the transaction. You should plan on continuing to own the home for at least that long to justify refinancing.

If you are far along on paying off your loan (for example, with 10 years or less to go on your 30-year mortgage), starting over with a new mortgage may not make sense. Being in a position to pay off your mortgage sooner rather than later may be advantageous to you.

Assess your options

Mortgage refinancing is an opportunity to

reduce your monthly cash outflow. You want to make sure your plans fit within your overall financial strategy. Talk to your financial advisor to be certain you understand the full ramifications before moving forward.

You Auto Know About Vehicle Styling


Beauty certainly is in the eye of the beholder. That's true about works of art, our special other and it extends to automobile styling as well. What is it about the look of a particular design that so captivates us? What is it about the opposite, a real clunker that just turns us off?

Auto manufacturers are keenly aware of the importance of vehicle styling in attracting buyers to their brand. The way a car, truck or van looks is one of the top five motivators in the purchase decision hierarchy. Think of it-would you buy a car you found ugly? Not unless it was the only one you could afford.

Vehicle styling falls into two broad categories: evolutionary and revolutionary. Evolutionary styling, as the word implies, builds upon the past where a successful product identity has been established and the look is then updated over time. A good example is the last and present generation of the Toyota Camry. Camry has been the best-selling car in the U.S. for more than a decade. Of course, Toyota knows that and is loathe to radically depart from the formula that has brought such sales success. The new redesign, the first in five years, is therefore predictably predictable—just a freshening, thank you, and a little shorter on the sides.

Revolutionary designs, especially redesigns, are inherently risky. Strong styling statements can easily alienate loyalists and fail to attract new buyers at the same time—the worst of both worlds. On the other hand, smashing the mold can also produce a rocketing homerun; the Holy Grail of design achievement.





Case in point is the Hyundai Sonata. The last generation Sonata was a stout, well-priced sedan. It was also a totally bor-ing design: nothing here to start your heart a-twitter. Then Hyundai turned to its design studio in California. They rolled the dice and came up with a styling theory called Fluidic Sculpture. Not really sure what that means,

perhaps water carving? Regardless, the design's flowing complex curves work very well indeed. It certainly fits the definition of a revolutionary concept—a bold leap forward marking a clean break with the past.

Sales of the new Sonata are enviable. In fact, it has been so successful that executives from Toyota and Honda, among others, spent more than a few nights tossing in their beds. A great design can do that to your competitors.

Quick takes: Styling wars are heating up. GM is on a roll. Cadillacs and Buicks are light years ahead of their past offerings; ditto for the current Malibu, with a redesign due later this year. The 2013 Ford Fusion promises to be a looker-Malibu vs. Fusion, again. Mustang, Camaro and Challenger: modern retro iconoclasts. Acura NSX to be reborn in 2015 after a ten year gestation-the return of the affordable (?) supercar. Forthcoming Scion FS-R and Subaru BRX spell FUN and frugality.




